BACKGROUND: On Monday the City Council will hold a public hearing regarding the sale of 717 Waldo Street. The City obtained this property through the State of Iowa 657A process for abandoned property. We received 5 bids from interested parties for the purchase of 717 Waldo Street. All 5 bids submitted did include price and plans for the property. Of the 5 bids, 3 were complete with all documentation required. ACG Properties, LLC/Shane Torres was the high bidder in the amount of \$112,500. A copy of the purchase agreement is available for your review in the packet.

ALTERNATIVES: Do not sell the property

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS: \$112,500 in revenue

RECOMMENDATION: It is my recommendation that the Council approve the sale of 717 Waldo Street to ACG Properties/Shane Torres in the amount of \$112,500. Requirements of the property are outlined and identified in the purchase agreement.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-47

Resolution Approving Development Agreement with ACG Properties, LLC, Authorizing Annual Appropriation Tax Increment Payment and Pledging Certain Tax Increment Revenues to the Payment of the Agreement

WHEREAS, the City of Polk City, Iowa (the "City"), pursuant to and in strict compliance with all laws applicable to the City, and in particular the provisions of Chapter 403 of the Code of Iowa, has adopted an Urban Renewal Plan for the Polk City Area II Urban Renewal Area (the "Urban Renewal Area"); and

WHEREAS, this City Council has adopted an ordinance providing for the division of taxes levied on taxable property in the Urban Renewal Area pursuant to Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa and establishing the fund referred to in Subsection 2 of Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa (the "Urban Renewal Tax Revenue Fund"), which fund and the portion of taxes referred to in that subsection may be irrevocably pledged by the City for the payment of the principal of and interest on indebtedness incurred under the authority of Section 403.9 of the Code of Iowa to finance or refinance in whole or in part projects in the Urban Renewal Area; and

WHEREAS, a certain development agreement (the "Agreement") between the City and ACG Properties, LLC (the "Company") has been prepared in connection with the redevelopment of an existing commercial building on certain real property in the Urban Renewal Area for use in the business operations of a youth community center (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, under the Agreement, the City would provide annual appropriation tax increment payments to the Company in a total amount not exceeding \$110,000; and

WHEREAS, this City Council, pursuant to Section 403.9 of the Code of Iowa, has published notice, has held a public hearing on the Agreement on April 25, 2022, and has otherwise complied with statutory requirements for the approval of the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A of the Code of Iowa ("Chapter 15A") declares that economic development is a public purpose for which a City may provide grants, loans, tax incentives, guarantees and other financial assistance to or for the benefit of private persons; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A requires that before public funds are used for grants, loans, tax incentives or other financial assistance, a City Council must determine that a public purpose will reasonably be accomplished by the spending or use of those funds; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A requires that in determining whether funds should be spent, a City Council must consider any or all of a series of factors;

NOW, THEREFORE, It Is Resolved by the City Council of the City of Polk City, Iowa, as follows:

- Section 1. Pursuant to the factors listed in Chapter 15A, the City Council hereby finds that:
 - (a) The Project will add diversity and generate new opportunities for the Polk City and Iowa economies;
 - (b) The Project will generate public gains and benefits, particularly in the creation of new jobs, which are warranted in comparison to the amount of the proposed property tax incentives.
- Section 2. The City Council further finds that a public purpose will reasonably be accomplished by entering into the Agreement and providing the incremental property tax payments to ACG Properties, LLC.
- Section 3. The Agreement is hereby approved and the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Agreement on behalf of the City, in substantially the form and content in which the Agreement has been presented to this City Council, and such officers are also authorized to make such changes, modifications, additions or deletions as they, with the advice of bond counsel, may believe to be necessary, and to take such actions as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of the Agreement.
- Section 4. All payments by the City under the Agreement shall be subject to annual appropriation by the City Council, in the manner set out in the Agreement. As provided and required by Chapter 403 of the Code of Iowa, the City's obligations under the Agreement shall be payable solely from a subfund (the "ACG Properties, LLC Subfund") which is hereby established, into which shall be paid that portion of the income and proceeds of the Urban Renewal Tax Revenue Fund attributable to property taxes derived from the property as described as follows:

Certain real property situated in the City of Polk City, Polk County, State of Iowa bearing Polk County Property Tax Parcel Identification Number 261/00132-001-000.

- Section 5. The City hereby pledges to the payment of the Agreement the ACG Properties, LLC Subfund and the taxes referred to in Subsection 2 of Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa to be paid into such Subfund, provided, however, that no payment will be made under the Agreement unless and until monies from the ACG Properties, LLC Subfund are appropriated for such purpose by the City Council.
- Section 6. After the certification of indebtedness to the County Auditor of Polk County, Iowa and the continuing pledging of the ACG Properties, LLC Subfund and the portion of taxes to be paid into such Subfund and, pursuant to the direction of Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa, the County Auditor shall allocate the taxes in accordance therewith and in accordance with the tax allocation ordinance referred to in the preamble hereof.

DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into between the City of Polk City, Iowa (the "City") and ACG Properties, LLC (the "Company") as of the ____ day of ______, 2022 (the "Commencement Date").

WHEREAS, the City has established the Polk City Area II Urban Renewal Area (the "Urban Renewal Area"), and has adopted a tax increment ordinance for the Urban Renewal Area; and

WHEREAS, the Company owns certain real property, which is situated in the City, lies within the Urban Renewal Area and is more specifically described on Exhibit A hereto (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, the Company has proposed to undertake the redevelopment of an existing building (the "Project") on the Property for use in the business operations of a youth community center; and

WHEREAS, the Company has requested that the City provide financial assistance in the form of incremental property tax payments to be used by the Company in paying the costs of constructing and maintaining the Project; and

WHEREAS, the taxable base valuation (the "Base Valuation") of the Property for purposes of calculations under this Agreement and Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa is \$299,000; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A of the Code of Iowa authorizes cities to provide grants, loans, guarantees, tax incentives and other financial assistance to or for the benefit of private persons;

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

A. Company's Covenants

1. <u>Project Construction; Operational Requirement.</u> The Company agrees to construct the Project on the Property. The Company agrees that the Project shall minimally include the improvements (the "Required Improvements") as set forth on Exhibit B hereto. The Company agrees to construct the Project, including the Required Improvements, in substantial conformance with the City's zoning, land use, building and safety codes and regulations. The Company further agrees to substantially complete such construction by no later than December 31, 2022.

The Company agrees to maintain ownership of the Project and to ensure that the completed Project is used in the business operations of a youth community center (the "Operational Requirement") throughout the Term (as hereinafter defined) of this Agreement

The Company further agrees to maintain, preserve, and keep the Property, including but not limited to the Project, useful and in good repair and working order, ordinary wear and tear excepted, and from time to time will make all necessary repairs, replacements, renewals, and

additions. Further, the Company agrees to maintain compliance with local zoning, land use, building and safety codes and regulations.

- 2. <u>Company's Operational Certifications.</u> The Company agrees to certify (the "Operational Certification") to the City by no later than October 15 of each year during the Term (as hereinafter defined) commencing October 15, 2023, that the Company owns the Project and that the Company is in compliance with the Operational Requirement. Each Operational Certification shall be accompanied by documentation demonstrating, to the satisfaction of the City, that the Company is in compliance with the Operational Requirement.
- 3. <u>Property Taxes.</u> The Company agrees to make or ensure timely payment of all property taxes as they come due with respect to the Property with the completed Project thereon throughout the Term (as hereinafter defined) and to submit a receipt or cancelled check in evidence of each such payment.
- 4. Property Tax Payment Certification. The Company agrees to certify to the City by no later than October 15 of each year during the Term (as hereinafter defined) commencing October 15, 2023, an amount (the "Company's Estimate") equal to the estimated Incremental Property Tax Revenues anticipated to be paid in the fiscal year immediately following such certification with respect to the taxable valuation of the Property. In submitting each such Company's Estimate, the Company will complete and submit the worksheet attached hereto as Exhibit C. The City reserves the right to review and request revisions to each such Company's Estimate to ensure the accuracy of the figures submitted.

For purposes of this Agreement, Incremental Property Tax Revenues are calculated by: (1) determining the consolidated property tax levy (city, county, school, etc.) then in effect with respect to taxation of the Property; (2) subtracting (a) the debt service levies of all taxing jurisdictions, (b) the school district instructional support and physical plant and equipment levies, and (c) any other levies which may be exempted from such calculation by action of the Iowa General Assembly; (3) multiplying the resulting modified consolidated levy rate times any incremental growth in the taxable valuation of the Property (tied to commercial improvements as noted above), as shown on the property tax rolls of Polk County, above and beyond the Base Valuation; and (4) deducting any property tax credits which shall be available with respect to taxable incremental valuation of the Property.

Upon request, the City staff shall provide reasonable assistance to the Company in completing the worksheet required under this Section A.4.

5. <u>Default Provisions.</u>

- a. <u>Events of Default.</u> The following shall be "Events of Default" under this Agreement, and the term "Event of Default" shall mean, whenever it is used in this Agreement (unless otherwise provided), any one or more of the following events:
 - (i) Failure by the Company to complete construction of the Project pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

- (ii) Failure by the Company to maintain compliance with the Operational Requirement set forth in Section A.1 of this Agreement.
- (iii) Failure by the Company to fully and timely remit payment of property taxes when due and owing pursuant to Section A.4.
- (iv) Failure by the Company to comply with Sections A.2 and A.4 of this Agreement.
- (v) Failure by the Company to observe or perform any other material covenant on its part, to be observed or performed hereunder.
- b. <u>Notice and Remedies.</u> Whenever any Event of Default described in this Agreement occurs, the City shall provide written notice to the Company describing the cause of the default and the steps that must be taken by the Company in order to cure the default. The Company shall have thirty (30) days from the mailing of the notice or from the personal delivery of the notice to cure the default or to provide assurances satisfactory to City that the default will be cured as soon as reasonably possible. If the Company fails to cure the default or provide assurances, the City shall then have the right to:
 - (i) Pursue any action available to it, at law or in equity, in order to enforce the terms of this Agreement.
 - (ii) Withhold the Payments provided for under Section B.1 below.

B. <u>City's Obligations</u>

1. <u>Payments</u>. In recognition of the Company's obligations set out above, the City agrees to make seven (7) annual economic development tax increment payments (the "Payments" and each, individually, a "Payment") to the Company during the Term (as hereinafter defined) of this Agreement pursuant to Chapters 15A and 403 of the Code of Iowa, provided, however, that the aggregate total amount of the Payments to be made to the Company under this Agreement shall not exceed [\$110,000] (The "Maximum Payment Total"). The Payments shall be subject to annual appropriation by the City Council, as provided hereunder.

The Payments shall not constitute general obligations of the City but shall be made solely and only from the Incremental Property Tax Revenues received by the City from the Polk County Treasurer attributable to the taxable valuation of the Property.

This Agreement assumes that the new taxable valuation of the Project will go on the property tax rolls as of January 1, 2023. Accordingly, the Payments will be made on June 1 of each fiscal year, beginning June 1, 2025, and continuing through and including June 1, 2031, or until such earlier date upon which total Payments equal to the Maximum Payment Total have been made.

2. <u>Annual Appropriation.</u> Each Payment shall be subject to annual appropriation by the City Council. Prior to December 1 of each year during the Term (as hereinafter defined) of this Agreement, commencing in calendar year 2023, the City Council of the City shall consider the question of obligating for appropriation to the funding of the Payment due in the following fiscal year an amount (the "Appropriated Amount") of Incremental Property

Tax Revenues to be collected in the following fiscal year equal to or less than the most recently submitted Company's Estimate.

In any given fiscal year, if the City Council determines to not obligate the then-considered Appropriated Amount, then the City will be under no obligation to fund the Payment scheduled to become due in the following fiscal year, and the Company will have no rights whatsoever to compel the City to make such Payment, to seek damages relative thereto or to compel the funding of such Payment in future fiscal years. A determination by the City Council to not obligate funds for any particular fiscal year's Payment shall not render this Agreement null and void, and the Company shall make the next succeeding submission of the Company's Estimate as called for in Section A.4 above, provided however that no Payment shall be made after June 1, 2031.

- 3. Payment Amounts. Each Payment shall be in an amount equal to the corresponding Appropriated Amount (for example, for the Payment due on June 1, 2025, the amount of such Payment would be determined by the Appropriated Amount determined for certification by December 1, 2023), provided, however, that no Payment shall exceed the amount of Incremental Property Tax Revenues received by the City from the Polk County Treasurer attributable to the taxable valuation of the Property.
- **4.** <u>Certification of Payment Obligation.</u> In any given fiscal year, if the City Council determines to obligate the then-considered Appropriated Amount, as set forth in Section B.3 above, then the City Clerk will certify by December 1 of each such year to the Polk County Auditor an amount equal to the most recently obligated Appropriated Amount.

C. Administrative Provisions

- 1. <u>Amendment and Assignment.</u> Neither party may cause this Agreement to be amended, assigned, assumed, sold or otherwise transferred without the prior written consent of the other party. However, the City hereby gives its permission that the Company's rights to receive the Payments hereunder may be assigned by the Company to a private lender, as security on a credit facility taken with respect to the Project, without further action on the part of the City.
- 2. <u>Successors.</u> This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the successors and assigns of the parties.
- 3. <u>Term.</u> The term (the "Term") of this Agreement shall commence on the Commencement Date and end on June 1, 2031, or on such earlier date upon which the aggregate sum of Payments made to the Company equals the Maximum Payment Total.
- **4.** Choice of Law. This Agreement shall be deemed to be a contract made under the laws of the State of Iowa and for all purposes shall be governed by and construed in accordance with laws of the State of Iowa.

The City and the Company have caused this Agreement to be signed, in their names and on their behalf by their duly authorized officers, all as of the day and date written above.

Subject: Amendment to the City 5-year CIP Plan (CIP)

The City Council approved a 5-year CIP on September 14, 2020. Most of the projects outlined in the first 2 years have been completed, however, some adjustments need to be made to the plan, as priorities have changed, and projects have been moved to different years. To adjust the CIP and reflect the City's priority projects we need to amend the City's CIP. I recommend the City Council set a public hearing for April 25, 2022 to amend the City's CIP.

The CIP included both projects and equipment. During this unique economic time, some of the pricing has significantly changed for projects and equipment. I will reflect new cost opinions and pricing for the projects that we have price changes for. Below is a summary of the last 2 fiscal years & status for the upcoming fiscal year, 2022-2023.

CIP Projects:

FY2020-2021: The following projects were prioritized:

- 1. Town Square Parking lot study-not completed, budgeted in FY2021-2022
- 2. Trail Study-Town Center (Trail)-project completed
- 3. Facility Needs Assessment-project completed

Proposed adjustments to projects 5-year CIP:

I recommend making the following changes to the CIP, based on past meetings with the City Council. I am not proposing the amendment include changes to the FY2020-2021 (1st year of the City 5-year CIP). The projects below are changes only, and if the project is not listed, the project remains un-changed in the CIP.

FY2021-2022:

Town Square Parking study (Project #4)-Project moved to FY21/22.

New Water Well (Project #38)-Remove project from the City's CIP. With Regionalization efforts, this does not seem to be a good investment for the community. We have discussed that the City did borrow funds for the project in 2021. Unfortunately, the roundabout project is over-budget from the original Engineer's estimate, however, with the removal of this project, the funds borrowed for this project can be used for the round-about overage costs.

Roundabout Project at N. 3rd Street & E. Vista Lake Drive (new Project #42)-Add project to the CIP for FY2021-2022. Construction for this project has begun. This project was not a planned for project in the City's CIP and we should add it. The project is already reflected in both FY22 & FY23 budgets.

W. Bridge Road Water Main loop (Project #37)-Adjust cost for project. Material costs have significantly increased, and the new cost estimate for this project is \$72,140.

FY2022-2023:

Regional Park Facility (Project #9)- The Regional Park project is not included in the FY22-23 budget. I would recommend we move this project to FY23-24. This project is a large-scale project, and the City Council needs to have further discussions on what priorities remain for the project to be completed.

Eastside Water Tower Project with DMWW (Project #36)- The water tower project is not included in the FY22-23 budget. The city is behind schedule on this project. I would expect engineering may begin on the project in FY23, however, construction will more than likely occur in FY23-24. I recommend we move this project to FY23-24.

Water Tower Painting (Project #41)- This project will need to coincide with the completion of the water tower construction. In order to paint the existing water tower and clean it out, we will need to take it off-line. This project will also need to be moved to FY23-24.

City Hall/Police/Fire Station Rebuilding/Remodel (Project #2)- This project is in the FY22-23 budget. The current plan involves building a new City Hall, remodeling the Fire Station, and purchasing land for a future Police Station. I recommend we amend the CIP to reflect this change. This project was originally planned to occur in FY24-25.

2022 Street Repair Project (Project #30)- This project is identified in the FY22-23 budget. This project should be an ongoing project and was not recognized as one when the City completed the 5-year CIP. I recommend we add this project to the CIP. We will also plan to add future years of the Street Repair project.

N. 3rd Street Trail connection to outer city limits (Phase 2) (Project #15)- The City has received \$75,000 in grant funds for the project. I have increased the cost of the project \$570,000 from \$495,000 to reflect the grant funding.

This will still show the priority, however, will not be included in the City's total cost for projects.

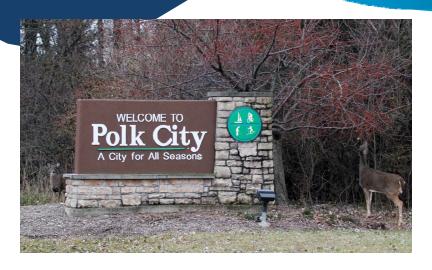

- 9. Public Works John Deere 3720 Replacement (Project #39)- This project is complete, and was a priority that needed to be adjusted in the CIP. Instead of completing projects #40 & #41 this was completed instead.
- 10. Public Works Street sweeper (new project #70)-Add project to the CIP for FY2021-2022. The City purchased this equipment in FY21-22.

1. General Overview and Introduction

A. INTRODUCTION

The Mayor and City Council requested that a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for future capital projects in Polk City be implemented. The main components of a CIP are to identify the projects and estimated costs of each project and devise a way to pay for these projects over a period of years.

A CIP is a tool for the scheduling, planning, and financing of large-scale projects and equipment purchases. A CIP provides the elected officials, city staff and the citizens with a list of the future projects that the City plans to complete over a period of 5 years. With that being said, it is not a plan that is definite, and it can be revised at any time. The adoption of a CIP does not obligate the City to take any course of authorization. It does not obligate the current or any future City Council to complete a project. The main focus is when a project or purchase may be completed and how it will be paid for. The final decision will be decided by the City Council during the preparation of the annual city budget and the actual award of a contract to complete any given project.

The City Council has set a Public Hearing for the proposed CIP on September 14, 2020 at 6pm. Comments are welcomed and encouraged from the public. Questions and comments may be sent to jgibbons@polkcityia.gov prior to 5pm on September 14, 2020.

After Polk City's CIP is adopted, we will review and possibly amend each year. Completed projects will be checked off the City's list. New projects may be added to the CIP. Some projects may change in scope or cost.

B. PHASE I-IDENTIFICATION OF POTENTIAL PROJECTS

The City began the CIP by identifying all projects and equipment purchases. The elected officials and city staff identified 41 capital projects and 69 equipment purchases. While acknowledged early on that the City does not have the capability of completing all projects identified, it is a good exercise for the City to identify the long-term infrastructure needs in Polk City.

The City Council held its first work session related to the 5-year CIP on May 11, 2020. At that work session, a list of all projects was reviewed and discussed. The Mayor and City Council were directed to individually grade each project prior to the upcoming work session. Each elected official participated in the exercise and submitted rankings to the City Manager.

A complete list of the projects and equipment are attached as Exhibit A and is located at the back of this plan.

C. PHASE II-RANKING OF CAPITAL PROJECTS

The second phase of the CIP process involved the ranking of the proposed projects. Once each elected official graded the 41 listed projects, a ranking was designated to each project. The following A to F grades were used by the elected officials when rating a particular project:

- An "A" (4 points) ranking determines this is a very high priority project
- A "B" (3 points) ranking determines this is a high priority project
- A "C" (2 points) ranking determines this is a moderate priority project
- A "D" (1 point) ranking would indicate that this project should be postponed to some date beyond
- An "F" (0 points) ranking indicates that you are not interested in completing this project

The projects were then ranked accordingly. A project could receive anywhere from 0-24 points. A perfectly scored project, 24 points, would be graded "A" amongst 6 elected officials. The rankings were tabulated and discussed at the work session on June 8, 2020. All projects were placed accordingly into their respective years, and some project adjustments were made by the City Council.

A complete list of the project rankings is attached as Exhibit B and is located at the back of this plan.

D. POTENTIAL SOURCES OF FUNDING FOR CAPITAL PROJECTS

The City has multiple sources of revenue and means of accomplishing the capital projects and equipment purchases identified in this Capital Improvement Plan. Listed below is an overview of the sources of revenue the City will be utilizing to implement these projects:

1. General Obligation Loans-The City currently has 3 outstanding General Obligation loans (G.O. 2014 sewer improvements, G.O. 2018 water improvements, and 2020 G.O. 2020 asphalt overlay street project). Many cities utilize GO loans to pay for capital projects. The main restriction regarding general obligation is the amount borrowed cannot exceed the City's constitutional debt limit. A city's constitutional debt limit is 5% of all their taxable valuations. A City can borrow the full amount of their debt limit, however, for good financial planning I would recommend at a maximum we try to stay somewhere between 75%-80% to allow for emergency purposes.

It is also important to note that the City also has 10 Tax Increment Financing (TIF) rebate agreements. Each agreement does count against the City's constitutional debt limit, however, it is important to note that because the Council annually appropriates those agreements (meaning that the Council has to agree to pay each year) that only the annual dollar amount counts against the City's constitutional debt limit.

This proposed CIP includes borrowing for General Obligation bonds for 4 Capital Improvement projects in the following years:

- 2020-2021 Project #33 HMA Overlay street project-total amount borrowed: \$1,750,000
- 2022-2023 Project #9 Regional Park Facility (financing for this project also includes grant funding and General Fund cash) & Project #15 N. 3rd Street trail connection to outer city limits-total amount borrowed: \$2,184,000
- 2023-2024 Project #14 N. 3rd Street trail and intersection alignment at Northside Dr- total amount borrowed: \$1,227,000
- 2024-2025 Project #2 City Hall/Fire Station/Police rebuild/remodel-total amount borrowed: \$2,000,000
- General Fund-The City has the option of financing some of the less expensive projects with money from the General Fund. The largest revenue source for the General Fund is property taxes.

This proposed CIP includes utilizing General Fund money for the following projects:

- 2020-2021 Project #4 Town Square Parking Study
- 2020-2021 Project #17 Trail Study-Town Center
- 2020-2021 Project #1 Facility Needs Assessment
- 2020-2021 Project #30 2020 Street repair project
- 2022-2023 Project #9 Regional Park Facility (financing for this project also includes grant funding and GO Loan)

- 2024-2025 Project #29 Sump Pump collector lines (Option for special assessment)
- 2024-2025 Project #21 North Broadway sidewalks (Option for special assessment)
- 3. Sanitary Sewer and Water Revenue Loans-The City can issue sanitary sewer revenue and water revenue bonds or loans to finance sewer and water capital projects. To repay back these loans, the City pledges sanitary sewer or water user fee revenues to pay back these loans. Revenue loans do not count against the City's constitutional debt limit. They are a great source of borrowing for some of those larger projects for the sanitary sewer or water systems.

This proposed CIP includes borrowing for water revenues bonds for 2 capital improvement projects, slated to occur in the same year:

- 2022-2023 Project #36 Eastside Water Tower project with Des Moines Water Works & Project
 #41 Water Tower Painting-total amount borrowed \$2,404,800
- **4.** Enterprise Funds (Water & Sewer)- The City has the option of financing some of the less expensive projects with money from the water or sewer fund, or in other words utilizing money from the water or sewer operating budget. The revenue for both funds comes from user fees.

This proposed CIP includes utilizing Water money for the following projects:

- 2021-2022 Project #37 W. Bridge Road water main loop
- 2021-2022 Project #38 New water well

This proposed CIP includes utilizing Sewer money for the following projects:

- 2021-2022 Project #26 Inflow/Infiltration study
- 2021-2022 Project #23 North trunk sewer study
- 2022-2023 Project #24 Northeast trunk sewer study
- 2023-2024 Project #27 Parker Lift station upgrade
- 2024-2025 Project #28 TCI Lift station upgrade
- Road Use Tax-The City does receive RUT money. Some of the less expensive projects (equipment purchases) could be financed from this fund.

This proposed CIP includes utilizing RUT for one project:

- 2023-2024 Project #35 WhiteTail Parkway Corridor Study
- Grants-The City should consider grant programs for some capital projects. Some of the proposed grants include Enhance Iowa CAT (Community Attraction and Tourism), Resource Enhancement

and Protection Grant (REAP), Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), Revitalize Iowa's Sound Economy (RISE), Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG), and Surface Transportation Program (TAP). There are other smaller grant programs available, however, this grant list is comprised of the larger opportunities available for funding.

The City will apply for any grant opportunities available for projects outlined in this CIP. One of the benefits of having a CIP in place is it sets guidelines for the city staff to apply for possible grant opportunities. This project utilizes grant funding for 2 projects:

- 2022-2023 Project #9 Regional Park Facility-estimated \$2,000,000 in grants/private donations
- 2023-2024 Project #14 N. 3rd Street Trail and intersection alignment at Northside Dr.-STBG awarded \$393,000
- 7. Donations-It is common for cities to receive donations for library related projects, park improvements, trails, fire department and police department equipment and building updates/remodels. These contributions can be individual, service clubs, gaming establishments, and corporations within the community.
- Local Option Sales Tax-The voters of Polk City approved local option sales tax in 1985. The City
 Council at the time adopted a resolution which stated that LOST would be used for the following:
 - a. 50% Property Tax Relief
 - b. 50% General Purpose

Since the resolution states that 50% of the LOST will be used for property tax relief, the City can allocate this revenue for any public purpose in the General Fund. For example, it could be used for general operating expenses, such as salaries.

For this proposed CIP, we will spend 50% on general fund activities, and 50% for projects outlined in the plan. Those projects include:

- 2021-2022 Project #11 Lost Lakes Park-Phase II
- 2022-2023 Project #3 City Hall Parking lot
- 2022-2023 Project #15 N. 3rd Street Trail connection to outer city limits (\$380,000 LOST, remainder paid with GO Loan)
- 2023-2024 Project #18 West Bridge Road trail gap at Van Dorn property
- 2023-2024 Project #32 Van Dorn/3rd Street Intersection improvements
- 2023-2024 Project #34 East Broadway Street improvements

- 2024-2025 Project #19 West Bridge trail-Parker to Neal Smith Trail
- 2024-20205 Project #10 Twelve Oaks Parks-Phase II
- 9. Low to Moderate Income (LMI) money- Under the Code of Iowa, the City is required by law to set-aside a percentage of money to be used for low to moderate income families when TIF incentives are given to a residential developer. That percentage in Polk County is 39% in FY20-21. The City has incurred a large amount of LMI money over the years and has incorporated spending a portion of that to finance projects that benefit residential properties that meet the requirements. The LMI rate in Polk City is currently 28%. The City can utilize 28% of LMI money on critical infrastructure needs for the water and sewer utility. These projects include:
 - 2021-2022 Project #37 W. Bridge Road water main loop
 - 2021-2022 Project #38 New Water well
 - 2022-2023 Project #36 Eastside Water Tower project with DMWW & Project #41 Water Tower Painting(financed together)
 - 2022-2023 Project #8 Property purchase
 - 2023-2024 Project #27 Parker lift station upgrades
 - 2024-2025 Project #29 Sump Pump collector lines
 - 2024-2025 Project #28 TCI lift station upgrades

E. OPTIONAL FUNDING SOURCES-NOT USED IN THIS CIP

The City could generate additional revenue for capital projects by authorizing any of the below sources:

- Capital Improvement Fund Tax Levy- The City has the opportunity to levy 67.5 cents per \$1,000
 assessed of taxable valuations, if approved by the voters. Many cities utilize this to fund capital
 projects. This additional voted on levy would generate an additional \$183,500. It is important to note
 this is a separate levy, and if the city did levy for the full amount, we would be adding \$.67500 to the
 City's overall tax levy.
- 2. Franchise Fees for Electric and Gas-The City can impose up to a 5% fee on electric, cable, and gas utility revenues. The City of Polk City is currently receiving a 1% franchise fee from both the electric and natural gas utilities, which will generate \$40,000 for the City's General Fund. The City retains the option of increasing the fees from 1% to 5% for the purpose of funding capital projects in the future. If the City should ever decide to request the additional 4% in franchise fees, the City would allocate an additional \$160,000 per year to finance capital projects, or an additional \$40,000 annually per percentage implemented. These additional fees have not been included in this proposed CIP.

- 3. Special Assessments- The City may construct infrastructure and then assess a portion of the cost back to the properties that benefit from the improvements. Two projects in the CIP are being financed with General Fund reserve money, with an opportunity to special assess after construction.
- 4. Storm Water Utility- The City can establish a storm water utility with user fees to help pay for some storm water related projects. Cities can either charge a flat fee for classification of property or may calculate based upon the amount of runoff from the property. We have discussed this amongst the Council and there seems to be some interest. A \$1 monthly charge for residential and \$2 for commercial would generate approximately \$30,000 annually.
- 5. Tax Increment Financing- The City has the capability of paying for capital projects through Tax Increment Financing, also known as TIF. As long as the City incurs a debt or contractual obligation to fund a project located in an urban renewal area, the City can request TIF to finance infrastructure improvements. TIF has not been utilized to pay for projects within the CIP, and that could still be an option.

F. CASH FLOW PROJECTIONS

Incorporated into this CIP are cash flows for all the city funds intended to be used for this plan. Those documents are located at the back of the CIP, and identified as Exhibits C-N.

G. AMORTIZATION SCHEDULES

Incorporated into this CIP are amortization schedules used for the 4 projects the City plans to issue new debt for. Those documents are located at the back of the CIP and identified as Exhibits 1-4.

H. PROJECT PROFILES

After the City Council narrowed down the list of projects further, and placed projects into their appropriate fiscal year, I asked the City's Engineering firm to provide up to date cost estimates for each project within their respective year planned for construction. Of the 41 projects presented to the City Council, 31 have been incorporated into this 5-year plan and 10 have not.

The following is a list of the project profiles, with up to date cost estimates.

Calls for Service

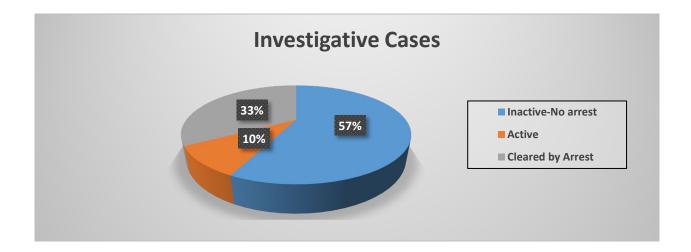

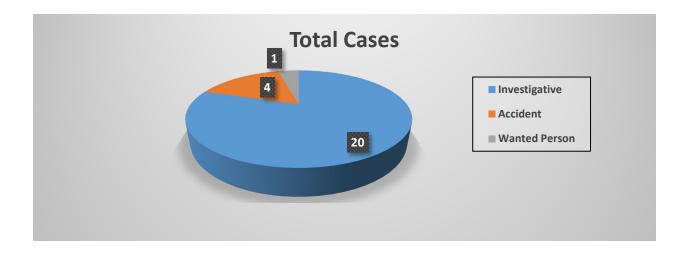


Cases Made

The Police Department had

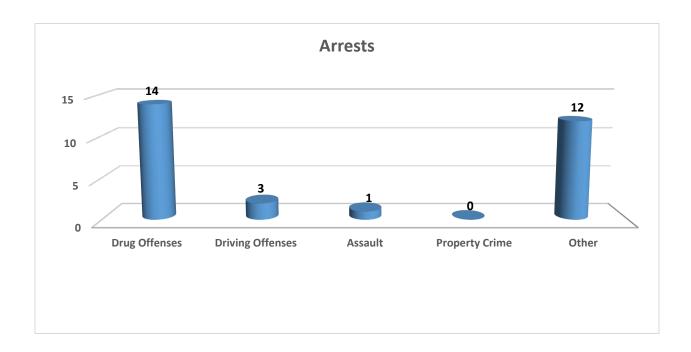
25 total cases during the month of March. 20 of the cases were investigative incident reports, 4 were for traffic collisions, and 1 case for wanted person. There are 2 active investigations from this month. There was a 33% rate of cases cleared by arrest, for investigative cases in March.





Arrests Made

The Police Department made **30** arrests and issued **18** citations and **58** warnings. The arrests consisted of **14** arrests for drug offenses, **3** arrest for driving offenses, **1** arrest for Assault, and **12** arrests for Other which includes **11** arrests of wanted people and **1** arrest for Public Intoxication.



Notable Incidents

Case #22-0057

On March 3, 2022, a Polk City Officer stopped a vehicle for a traffic violation. The driver was identified as a 33-year-old Minburn man. An investigation resulted in the seizure of a small amount of THC wax and paraphernalia. He was charged with Possession of Marijuana and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. He was released to appear. A charge of OWI-1st Offense is pending DCI lab results.

Case #22-0048

On March 4, 2022, Polk City Police Officer executed a search warrant on a residence in Polk City. The search warrant was part of a narcotics investigation conducted by the department. Officers seized over an ounce of methamphetamine, a small amount of marijuana, numerous pieces of meth and marijuana paraphernalia and a firearm. A 26-year-old Polk City man was charged with Possession of Methamphetamine with Intent to Deliver, Failure to Affix Drug Tax Stamp, Possession of Marijuana, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, and Unlawful Possession of Prescription Drugs. He was booked into the Polk County Jail.

Case #22-0075

On March 29th, Polk City Police Officers executed a search warrant on a residence in Polk City as a part of a narcotics investigation. The investigation at the scene resulted in the apprehension of a 19-year-old Des Moines man who had outstanding warrants for his arrest for Theft 1st Degree, Felony Eluding, Possession of Controlled Substance, Operating Motor Vehicle without Owner's Consent, and numerous traffic violations. Drug paraphernalia was seized from the residence during the search for narcotics. The wanted man was booked into the Polk County Jail. The resident of the home, a 22-year-old Polk City woman, was charged with Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.

Canine Program

Officer Aicher and Eudoris attended the Annual USPCA Certification Trials on March 28th and 29th in Spencer, Iowa. Each year the handler and their dog are retested to ensure they maintain the proper fundamentals of training and technique. Officer Aicher and Eudoris successfully completed the course and achieved certification.

Officer Aicher and K9 Eudoris conducted 16 hours together in February. This includes a combination of training at Canine Tactical in Chariton, Iowa, and ongoing training throughout the month. Training in March was focused on areas of narcotic detection and building searches.

Officer Aicher and K9 Eudoris were deployed 6 times in March. All deployments were for narcotics detection.



Canine Program Notable Incident: Case #22-0067

On March 22, 2022, Officer Aicher conducted a traffic stop. The driver was identified as a 49-year-old Ankeny woman. During the stop, Officer Aicher developed information leading him to believe narcotics were in the vehicle. Eudoris was deployed on the vehicle. Eudoris alerted to the presence of the odor of narcotics in the vehicle. A probable cause search of the vehicle was conducted resulting in the seizure of user amounts of methamphetamine, marijuana, and some drug paraphernalia. The woman was charged with Possession of Methamphetamine, Possession of Marijuana-2nd Offense and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. She was booked into the Polk County Jail.

Subject: Amendment to the Employee Handbook re: Overtime for EMS personnel

BACKGROUND: For the Council's consideration on Monday is an amendment to the Employee handbook. This proposed change is specific to calculating overtime for EMS personnel. Our previous handbook did cover this provision, by referencing Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), however, this amendment will spell it out more specifically to what those requirements are under FLSA.

Most non-exempt employees are eligible for overtime (time and a half) once they have worked more than 40 hours in a work week. The requirements are different for EMS personnel, and I believe we need to reflect this in the Employee Handbook. EMS personnel are eligible for overtime (time and a half) once they have worked more than 212 hours in a 28-day period.

ALTERNATIVES: Do not approve the change

Paid leaves, vacation time, and holidays shall **not** be counted as working time for the purpose of determining overtime. The choice between cash and/or compensatory time will be at the discretion of the supervisor. Except for emergencies, the employee's immediate supervisor must approve any work in excess of the normal work period in advance.

With approval from their department head, employees may be expected to work overtime. If you are a non-exempt employee and work in excess of forty hours in any workweek, you will be paid either cash or compensatory time at a rate of time and one-half. Employees engaged in fire protection or law enforcement may have different work periods and their overtime shall be compensated in accordance with Section 7(k) of the Fair Labor Standards Act. Paid leaves, vacation time, and holidays shall **not** be counted as working time for the purpose of determining overtime. The choice between cash and/or compensatory time will be at the discretion of the supervisor. Except for emergencies, the employee's immediate supervisor must approve any work in excess of the normal work period in advance.

The standard work week and overtime calculation for paramedics and other Fire/EMS protection personnel shall be based on two hundred twelve (212) working hours in a twenty-eight (28) day period. Non-exempt employees whose hours exceed two hundred twelve (212) working hours in a twenty-eight (28) day period will be calculated at one and one-half (1 1/2) times their regular rate.

Subject: Automatic Aid Agreement with Ankeny FD

BACKGROUND: The City of Polk City has had an Automatic Aid agreement with the Ankeny Fire Department since March 1, 2010. As services and staffing has changed, this agreement has been revised. The last revision was July 1, 2014. Both parties felt it is again time to revise this agreement. The newly proposed agreement will remove joint response areas and the department having jurisdiction will be dispatched to respond and if assistance is needed, a call for mutual aid will be requested. We have also increased the fees for Change of Quarters (COQ) from \$50.00 to \$100.00 per event.

ALTERNATIVES: Not have an agreement.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS: This will increase the fees Polk City will be required to pay Ankeny for a COQ, but it will also increase the fees we receive from Ankeny. In 2021, Ankeny provided a COQ to Polk City nine times. Polk City FD provided a COQ to Ankeny 196 times. This should be a revenue benefit for Polk City.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve the attached revised Automatic Aid Agreement with the City of Ankeny, see attached.

AUTOMATIC AID AGREEMENT

This AUTOMATIC AID AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is entered into this 1st day of July 2022 by and between the City of Ankeny and the City of Polk City, Iowa.

AUTOMATIC AID

- 1. Situations Where Aid is Provided. All calls for fire and emergency medical services within the defined automatic aid agreement area shall result in an automatic, simultaneous response from both the Polk City and Ankeny Fire Departments. To accomplish this, the Polk County Emergency Communications Center shall simultaneously dispatch both the Polk City and Ankeny Fire Departments. This automatic aid Agreement shall be in effect 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
- 2. **No Reimbursement for Costs**. No party in this Agreement shall be required to reimburse any other party for the cost of providing the services set forth in the Automatic Aid sections of this Agreement. Each party shall pay its own costs for responding to the Emergency Incidents as described is said sections of this Agreement.

PARAMEDIC TIERED RESPONSE

Under this Agreement either fire department may provide paramedic level tiered response or ambulance transport when requested. The transporting service shall bill the patient for every patient transport. Both Ankeny and Polk City will maintain compliance with all applicable reimbursement laws.

- 1. Request for Tiered Response. Requests for a tiered response shall be made through the Polk County Emergency Communications Center.
- 2. Responsibility. Ankeny and Polk City shall maintain responsibility for the actions of its own personnel when functioning under the direction of a paramedic-qualified employee of either department as long as the direction provided does not violate the Iowa Department of Public Health, Bureau of EMS, Scope of Practice for EMS Providers or applicable law.
- 3. Ambulance Transport. Ambulance transport shall be provided by the fire department responsible for the address where the patient is located when available.

4. Payment. When Paramedic Tiered Response Service is provided the fire department requesting the tier shall reimburse the tiering agency a sum of \$200.00 per event. When possible, disposable supplies shall be provided by the transporting service.

PARAMEDIC INTEROPERABILITY

Each department has developed Standard Operating Procedures approved by the department's medical director that allow paramedic qualified personnel to utilize either services patient care equipment including the monitor/defibrillator, intravenous and pharmacy supplies while functioning under their own department protocols.

AUTOMATIC AID ENGINE COMPANY AND CHIEF OFFICER RESPONSE

As part of this Agreement, both Ankeny and Polk City will respond (when available) with a staffed engine company and Chief Officer to all reported or confirmed structure fires at locations within all the fire districts serviced by both Ankeny and Polk City. The dispatch of an engine company and Chief Officer will be made with the initial dispatch to the reported fire by the Polk County Emergency Communications Center.

EMS CHANGE OF OUARTERS COVERAGE

In the event either City has depleted their resources or ability to respond to an additional Emergency Medical Services call, a request shall be made to Polk County Emergency Communications Center for a "Change of Quarters Ambulance". When available, the requested agency shall provide a staffed ambulance to the requesting city to be available for immediate response.

The department requesting the change of quarters shall reimburse the agency that provided the change of quarters ambulance a sum of \$100 per event if the requested ambulance has left its home fire station to travel toward the requesting city. This reimbursement shall be waived in the event of a billable EMS transport occurs during the change of quarters. This reimbursement shall be made on a monthly basis from a statement of services provided by each city and a reconciliation of trips each way so that only one payment will be made from the city with the most change of quarters requests that month.

PERSONNEL AND EOUIPMENT

The Polk City Fire Chief and the Ankeny Fire Chief shall establish a response plan regarding the deployment of personnel and equipment in responding to Emergency

Incidents under this Agreement. In virtually all cases, responses will be consistent with the established Polk County Tiered Emergency Assets Management System (TEAMS) response cards. Any other required personnel and/or equipment will be determined by the incident Commander in his or her sole discretion. If first arriving responders determine that they can handle the incident with their own available resources, then they shall return the still responding units to their home city as quickly as possible.

LIABILITY/INDEMNIFICATION

Each party waives all claims against the other party for compensation for any property loss or damage, and/or personal injury or death occurring as a consequence of the performance of this Agreement. Each party shall bear the liability and/or cost of damage to its equipment and the death of, or injury to, its personnel, whether the death, injury or damage occurs at an emergency within the described boundary. To the extent allowed by law, each city shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless all other parties for damages, claims, demands, suits, judgments, costs and expenses arising from loss of or damage to private property and/or the death of or injury to private persons whether caused by either department responding within the parameters of this Agreement. Provided, however, nothing contained herein shall expand the immunity of a party granted to it by law.

Each party waives all claims against the other party for compensation for any property loss or damage, and/or personal injury or death occurring as a consequence of any negligent acts, conduct, instructions or commands given by the individual that assumes command (Incident Commander) at any Emergency Incident. This provision shall not apply to any acts, conduct, instructions or commands given by an officer in the capacity of Incident Commander, which are later determined at any time to have been grossly negligent, willful, wanton or reckless.

TERMINATION

Either party may withdraw from this Agreement by giving sixty (60) days written notice to the other party by certified mail.

PRIOR AGREEMENTS

This Agreement supersedes any other previous Agreements, either written or verbal, that may have existed to define the response of the two fire departments in this area.

Subject: Adjust City Fire & EMS Personnel pay rates

BACKGROUND: For a number of years, the City has established 2 rates of pay for all Fire & EMS Personnel. One rate is an hourly rate, and the second rate is a paid-on-call (POC) rate, which is specific to when employees are called out when on call. Having 2 rates of pay has created several issues for payroll, and to simplify the process, we recommend doing away with the POC rate, and paying all personnel their part-time hourly rate.

This adjustment will be net positive to all employees, as the POC rate is the lower of the 2 rates established for the department.

Personnel will continue to receive \$1 per hour when on call.

ALTERNATIVES: Do not approve the change.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS: For FY22, the estimated financial impact will be approximately \$2,500. For FY23, the estimated impact will be approximately \$10,000. This change will not impact either FY22 or FY23 budget, as the City budgets a higher amount for wages than it actually pays out because not all shifts end up being covered.

RECOMMENDATION: It is my recommendation that the City Council approve the adjustment, retroactive to March 16th. This retroactive change will cover the complete 4th quarter of FY22.

The Construction Drawings for Public Improvements associated with Four Seasons Polk City Plat 1 were approved by City Council on June 14, 2021. An Agreement to Complete was approved by City Council covering the remaining public improvements on November 22, 2021. The developer provided two certified checks as surety to receive approval of the Final Plat prior to completion of all punchlist items. The first, in the amount of \$5,100.00, covered remaining punchlist items, excluding seeding, while the second, in the amount of \$6,000.00, covered surface restoration and seeding. The Final Plat was approved on November 22, 2021.

The Polk City Public Works Department provided construction observation services for the public improvements and finds them to have been completed in substantial conformance with the approved construction drawings and specifications, including being subject to a rideability test as conducted by the Polk City Police Department, except for seeding, which has not yet been established. Snyder & Associates, Inc., provided construction administration services including review of material submittals, review of change orders, review of testing results for compliance with SUDAS and Polk City code, and preparation of punchlists for use by the Contractor and City Staff.

The developer's engineer, Shive-Hattery, Inc., has provided the as-built record drawings, including as-built elevations along swale flow lines in conformance with City requirements. In addition, the developer's engineer and land surveyor has certified that the pins for all property corners have been set and all detention facilities are constructed in substantial conformance with the approved Storm Water Management Plan.

Elder Corporation has provided a 4-year maintenance bond in the amount of \$1,041,840.75 for public storm sewer, public sanitary sewer, and public water main, services and associated appurtenances. Alliance Construction Group, LLC. has provided a 4-year maintenance bond in the amount of \$212,020.00 for reinforced PCC pavement, PCC sidewalk, PCC sidewalk and trail ramps, detectable warning panels, and PCC mailbox pads. The date of Council acceptance, anticipated to be April 25, 2022, will be the start date for these bonds, which shall be retained in the City Clerk's files.

Subject: FEH Design Services Proposal

BACKGROUND: For the City Council's consideration on Monday is a proposal from FEH for design services for the City Hall & Fire Station projects. This design services proposal will provide conceptuals for both of the projects. FEH will go through a process of meeting with key staff members to determine some of the important needs for the project. They will also utilize the information that was previously provided for spacing through the Facility Needs Assessment.

This process will be high-level but will provide for some conceptual work to share with the public. After the design services is completed, the City would look to enter into agreement for full design services. Full design & construction services will range from approximately 12-15% of the total project cost. The timeline for construction of the 2 projects is unknown, and once we hire an architect to proceed with full design, we will have a better timeline for the project.

This proposal is an unbudgeted project, however, I don't believe a budget amendment needs to be completed for this project because of where our budget is for capital projects. The City has received some additional revenue for planned projects, which has reduced expenses for capital projects. The City will utilize LOST for this project. Construction of City Hall & Fire Station will be paid for by a combination of GO loans proceeds, LOST, and some general fund reserves.

Subject: N. 3rd Street Speed Zone Change

BACKGROUND: With the reconstruction of the intersection of N. 3rd Street and E. Vista Lake Drive, I have had discussions with Chief Siepker on the 45-mph zone in that area. It is the consensus that 45 mph in that area is not warranted any longer. With more traffic using Hugg Drive and a future road intersecting with N. 3rd Street from Creekview Estates, as well as the new intersection that was designed for 35 mph, we felt it was necessary to lower the Speed limit to 35 mph. Currently the speed limit is 35 mph from Northside Dr to Madison Street and will be extended to the intersection of N. 3rd Street and Hugg Drive.

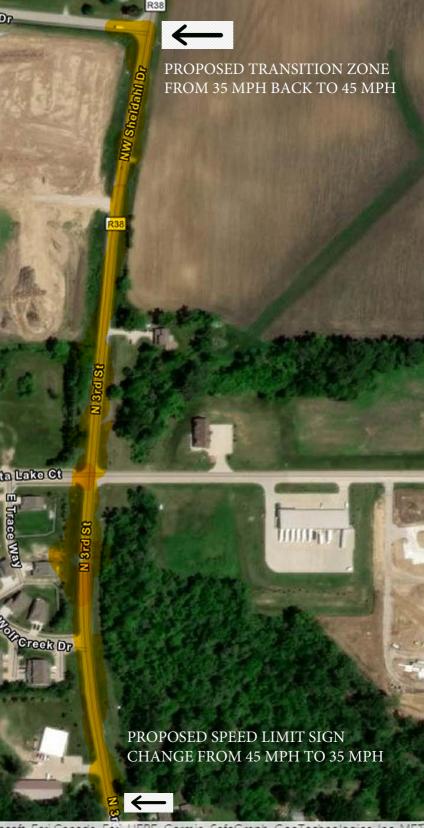
A portion of N. 3rd Street is in Polk County's jurisdiction, and they have agreed to change their zone to 35 mph as well.

I have provided a map to show the area in question.

ALTERNATIVES: Do not approve the change.

ORDINANCE NO. 2022-1400

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 63, SPEED REGULATIONS, SECTION 63.04, SPECIAL SPEED RESTRICTIONS

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Polk City, Iowa, that:

Section 1. Chapter 63, of the Polk City Code of Ordinances; Speed Regulations, Section 63.04, Special Speed Restrictions, is hereby amended by deleting subsection 1.A and inserting the following:

- a) On N. 3rd Street, from 1,350 feet north of Broadway to the intersection of N. 3rd Street and Hugg Drive
